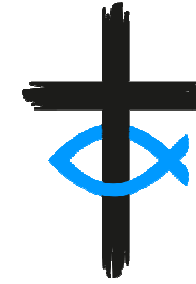
Church Magazine

Hadleigh United Reformed Church

History

Our church was founded in 1904 as Hadleigh Congregational Church, on land purchased with money donated by Thomas Dowsett J.P.

In 1972, we joined with many Congregational churches in a union with the Presbyterian Church of England to form the United Reformed Church. The union now includes the Re-formed Association of Churches of Christ, which joined in 1981, and the Congregational Union of Scotland, which joined in 2001.

Beliefs

The United Reformed Church (URC) stands in the Reformed tradition of Christian faith, which derives from the Reformation of the 16th century.

We believe in one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and find the supreme authority for faith and conduct by the guidance of the Spirit in the Word of God in the Bible.

We believe that through the sacrifice of Jesus Christ all are offered forgiveness, reconciliation and eternal life.

Church Structure

In the United Reformed Church, decisions are taken by members at Church Meetings under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Elders are elected to carry out the day-to-day running of each church.

At Hadleigh URC, Church Meetings are currently held bi-monthly whilst Elders' Meetings are held every month.

Neighbouring URC churches belong to an Area Partnership and Area Partnerships belong to a provincial council or Synod. Both bodies hold meetings approximately twice a year. A national council known as the General Assembly meets biennially to make the most important decisions.

Our church is part of the South Essex Area Partnership in the Eastern Synod.

Our Church building



We are 'low church' with no altar, no bells, no incense and few decorations.

A wooden cross on the East wall reminds us of the sacrifice of Jesus. The cross is empty to signify that Christ is risen and lives today.

A table used for Holy Communion stands in the middle of the platform and on it rests an open bible to signify our belief in the Word of God.

At the back of the church is a wooden World War 1 Roll of Honour that commemorates not only those who were killed during or as a result of the war but also those who served and survived.



Sunday Services

Our Sunday services normally comprise the reading of notices, a call to worship and then hymns interspersed with bible readings, a sermon, times of prayer, and an offertory. The hymns are sung to piano accompaniment. After all Sunday services there is a time of fellowship when refreshments are served.

At the present time, we do not have our own minister so services are led by ministers and lay preachers from other URC churches and from churches of other denominations. We do not currently have a Sunday School but children are very welcome.

Holy Communion

Holy Communion is a special part of our worship and is celebrated twice a month. This sacrament forms part of the service on the first Sunday evening and the third Sunday morning of each month. All who believe in the Lord are invited to partake.

During Communion, we remain seated and the bread and non-alcoholic wine (elements) are served by Elders. In sharing this symbolic meal, we recall the Last Supper. The bread and wine represent the body and blood of Jesus Christ and remind us of his sacrifice on the Cross.
